Earlier courses approved / run at IIT Bombay

The first course under this initiative was held at IIT Bombay in December 2015 by Prof. Sanjeeva Shrivastava (BSBE). We currently have 2 other GIAN courses coming up in summer 2016 by Professors Gandhi (ME) and Juneja (Civil).

Proposal Initiation

I would like to invite faculty colleagues to submit proposals under this scheme. The GIAN courses typically run for 1 or 2 week duration and can be combined with a CEP / QIP course as well, to bring in additional industry / faculty participation both for attending the courses as well as for being co-instructors, if necessary. The courses are video recorded and made available to the professional fraternity at large.

Next steps:

The GIAN local co-ordinator (self) will upload your proposal at the IIT-KGP website. After the proposal is approved by the GIAN committee, the next steps of course planning can be started. The CE & QIP office will provide all logistic support for the organization of the course. These include:

- Creation of CEP / QIP / TEQIP course proposal to run in tandem with GIAN course: This step may be necessary to augment finances for expenditure under heads beyond the scope of GIAN finances. As well, it is useful to
- attract industry participation both in terms of attendance and speakers if it is a CEP course. The proposal preparation itself may require iterations to link the GIAN course proposals with the proposals for CEP/ QIP-STTP course.

- Help with venue booking and other course related activities: Finances need to be classified under those permissible under GIAN, and others that may be met under CEP/ QIP course budget
- Guest invitee related logistics of visa and communication as necessary: The guest speaker will have to travel to India on a research visa and will have to apply for the same at the consulate office in his/her country. Invite letters to support the speakers application for research visa will be prepared and sent by the CEP office.
